To understand that Andrews Day is celebrated by some Scottish families.		Sing the UK countries song. One of the UK countries is celebrating a special day today. Can you guess which one? What can we remember about Scotland? Talk Partners.
 To know which country celebrates St Andrews Day and when. To be able to say some of the ways the day is celebrated. 	Suggested resources: St Andrews Stained Glass paper craft. Ask if any parents who celebrate the day could come and talk to the children.	Introduce Who knows what a patron saint is? Gather responses. It's someone who has died and has a special meaning for a particular group of people. Scots who celebrate St Andrew's day believe that St Andrew was a special man who helped spread the messages of Jesus and was one of Jesus followers. There's a story Scots tell that Andrew travelled across Europe telling people about Jesus. He built a church in Scotland in a place that is now called St Andrews. Some people did not like this and were not kind to Andrew. Every year the people of St Andrews and other Scottish towns and Scottish families living everywhere celebrate their connection with the saint.
