Queen Victoria ruled Britain from 1837-1901 – 64 years! She was married to Prince Albert and had 9 children. Lots of changes happened during Queen Victoria's <u>reign</u>, such as free <u>education</u> for children and inventions such as electric lights and telephones. Towns and cities like Sheffield grew, with lots of people working in <u>factories</u>. There was a lot of <u>poverty</u> and

many children had to work to help feed their family instead of going to school.

In 1893 the <u>law</u> changed and all children had to go to school. **Victorian school** was very strict with lots of rules. Children were given harsh <u>punishments</u> such as writing lines or wearing a <u>dunces' cap</u>, or even beaten with a <u>cane</u>! Children used chalk and blackboards. They would sit in rows and expected to be silent!






A lot of modern Christmas <u>traditions</u> started in Victorian times. Prince Albert helped make Christmas trees <u>popular</u>. Victorians would hang fruit and nuts on the trees, and candles instead of electric lights. Victorians also helped make crackers, Christmas cards and giving toys to each other popular.

Reign	The time that someone is king or queen.

Poverty	Not having enough money for basic needs such as food or a place to live.
Law	A rule that is made by the government.
Punishments	To make someone suffer because they have done something wrong.
Dunces' cap	A cone-shaped cap worn in former times by school children as punishment for slowness or laziness.
Cane	A hard stick.
Tradition	Something people have done or believed in for a long time.
Popular	Something that is liked or done by a lot of people.
Factory	A place where people build or make things.

To help the children understand what it woulhave been like to go to school in Victorian times, we hold a Victorian classroom day. The children sing the National Anthem to Queen Victoria and must follow

the class rules - including standing up when an adult enters to the room and not speaking unless spoken to. They follow the 3 Rs – reading, writing and arithmetic! They sit in rows and write on chalk boards. Sometimes the dunces' cap and the cane also comes out!
