WALT use expanded noun phrases

Remember to:

1. Know the definition
2. Fill in the missing adjectives
3. Write your own examples of expanded noun phrases
4. Use your expanded noun phrases to write sentences.

What is a noun phrase?

Introduce
(5 mins)

A noun phrase is a group of words in a sentence that acts like a noun.

It needs a determiner and a noun.

To expand the noun phrase we put an adjective (or two) before the noun.

For example...



Cut out the words cards (separate sheet) and arrange them to make as many different expanded noun phrases as you can!

Remember - you can use 2 adjectives in a noun phrase. Just make sure you put a comma in between!

For example: *the creamy, thick chocolate*

the

tasty

delicate

chocolate

a

delicious

trees

river

his

sticky

thick

waterfall

their

gooey

huge

sweet

treats


glistening

branches

factory

Write out your own expanded noun phrases using the favourite words that you chose earlier from your word bank.

Remember: DETERMINER + ADJECTIVE + NOUN
(You are not writing full sentences...yet!)

<u>nouns</u>	 <i>Chocolate Room</i>	<u>adjectives</u>

Now put the expanded noun phrases that you have created into a full sentence about the chocolate room.

Make sure you choose an appropriate **verb** for your sentence (**use your word bank!**)

EXAMPLE

Expanded noun phrase from earlier:

the creamy, thick chocolate

Put it into a sentence using an appropriate verb:

The creamy, thick chocolate oozed its way along the river.

Now let's try and add more detail to your sentences to help you describe the chocolate room using 'with', 'which' or 'that'.

EXAMPLE

Fits into the middle of the sentence to add extra information!

The creamy, thick chocolate, which tormented Charlie's taste buds, oozed its way along the river.



Do you notice what type of punctuation is used in this sentence before and after our piece of extra information?

Use 'with', 'which' or 'that' to add extra detail to the sentences that you wrote earlier.

Remember to include your commas in the correct places!
